

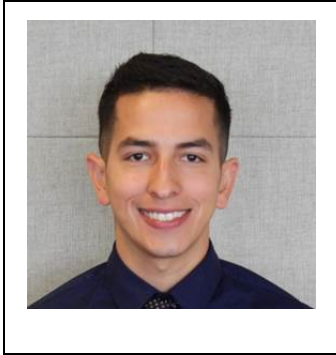

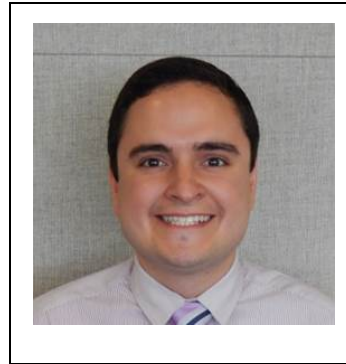
Pharmacy Practice Residents

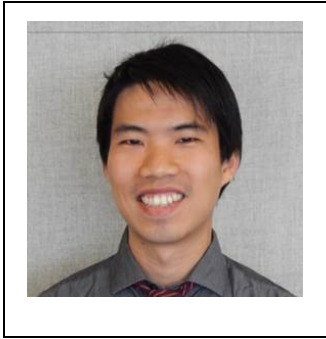


**Matias Campos

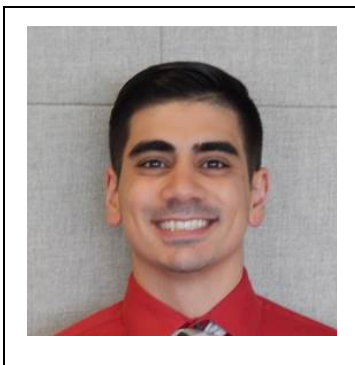

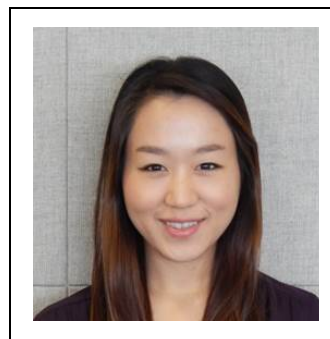


**David Hughes

It is truly bittersweet thinking about the last few weeks I will be spending at UCSF as a PGY-1. At this time last year, I was mapping a 3000 mile driving route

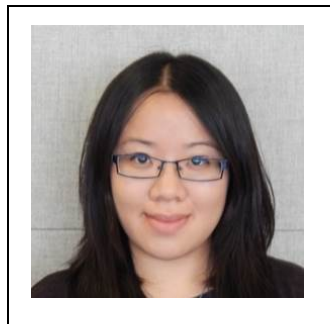

It seems like just yesterday when I was packing my bags and excited to move back to California. I cannot believe how quickly one year has passed by since

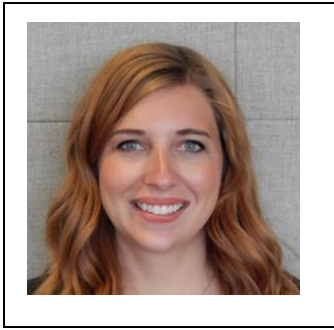

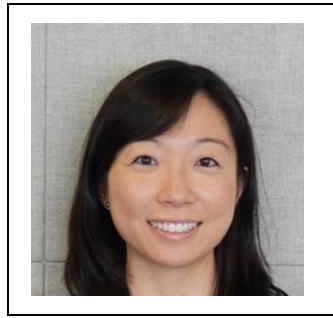


**Jessica Zook

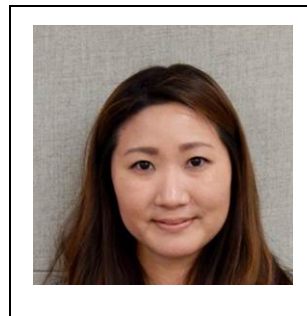


**Sarah Kim

I look forward to staying on at UCSF and continuing to work with the wonderful group of preceptors and mentors I have learned so much from.

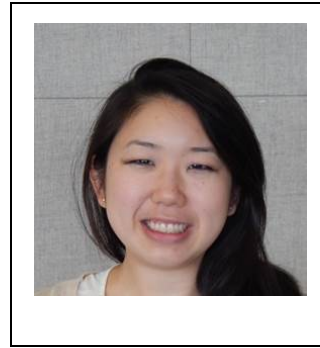
